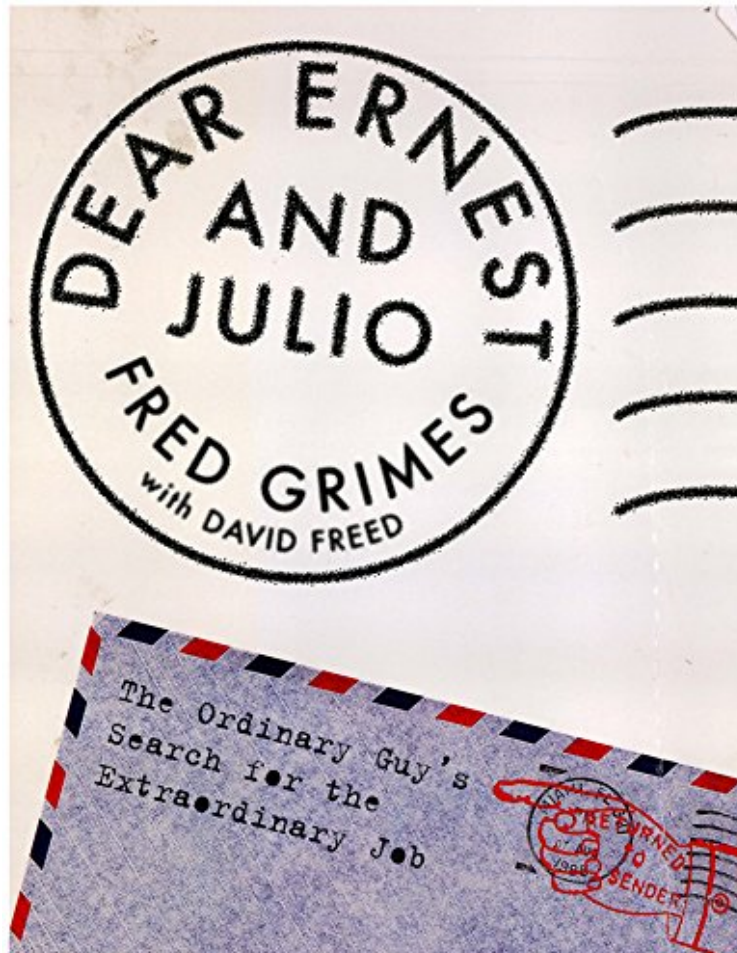


Dear Ernest and Julio: The Ordinary Guy's Search For The Extraordinary Job
